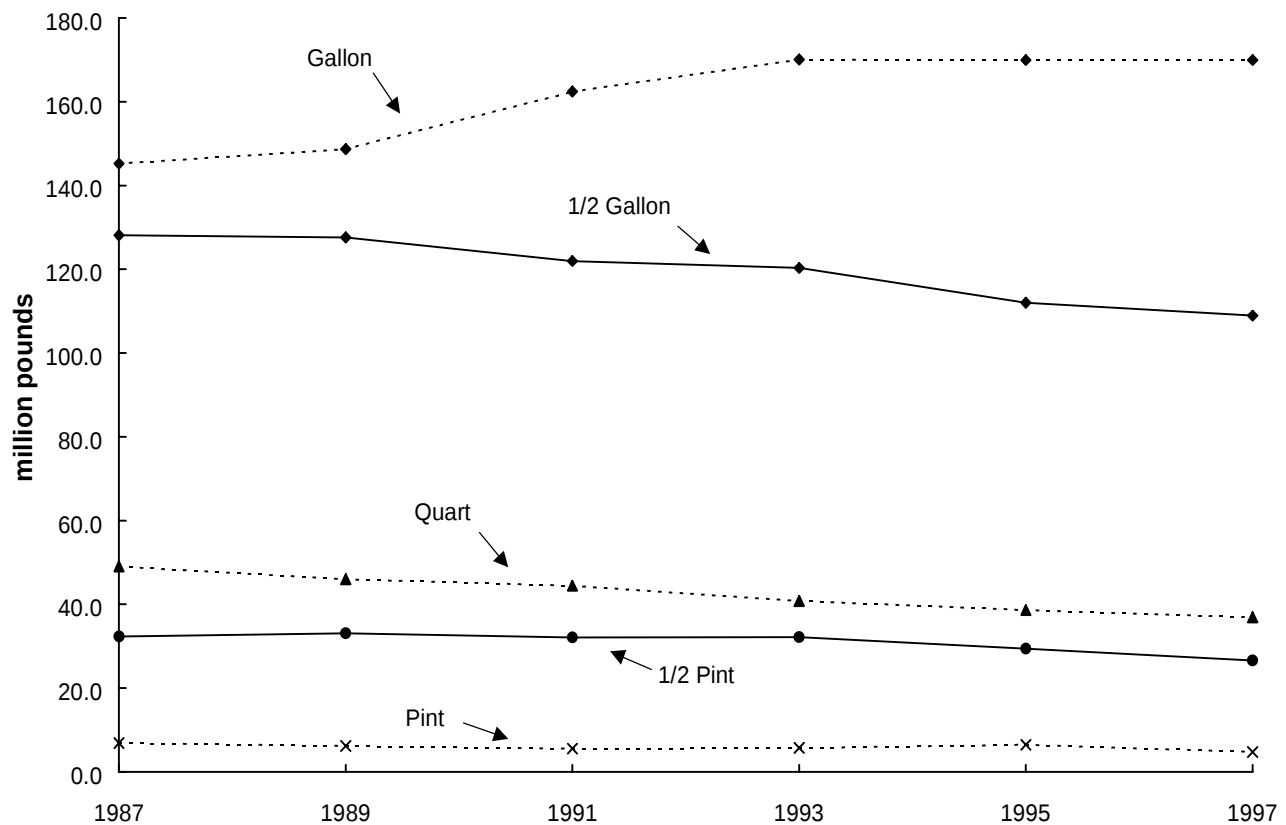

Sales Survey–November 1997

TABLES

Data

The data in the tables represent sales of packaged fluid milk products on routes inside the New York–New Jersey milk marketing area (Order No. 2). The information was obtained from container survey reports filed by handlers.

Qualified Use of Data

If information for a specific size of a specific product was obtained from fewer than three handlers, that amount was not included in the compilation. Similarly, if a specific size of a specific product yielded a total of less than 500 pounds, it was not included. The route sales that were excluded amounted to less than one-tenth of one percent of all sales.

TERMINOLOGY

Packaged Sales

The packaged fluid milk products sold on routes inside the marketing area consist of whole milk products and lowfat milk products. The whole milk products are plain milk and flavored milk. The lowfat milk products are: low test milk–1% and 2% butterfat content; skim milk; flavored milk drinks; and buttermilk.

Method of Distribution

Sales are classified as wholesale or home-delivered. Wholesale are those made to restaurants, schools, hospitals, supermarkets, grocery stores, military institutions, etc.

Type of Container

The three categories are glass, paper, and plastic. Plastic includes cans, tins, and bag-in-box containers.

Handler

A handler participating in the survey is one who (a) engages in the processing of fluid milk products and (b) has sales of packaged products on routes in the marketing area.

Regulated Handler and Plant

A regulated handler is one who operates a plant(s) under the provisions of Federal Order No. 2.

Producer-handler

A producer-handler is one who completely controls the production, processing, and distribution of the milk that he handles pursuant to the provisions of Order No. 2. According to these provisions, he may handle only a nominal amount of milk he does not produce.

Other Federal Order Handler and Plant

A handler regulated under another federal order is one who operates a plant(s) under the provisions of that order. Exception: If he has qualified as a regulated handler, only the plant is other order.

Non-regulated Handler and Plant

A non-regulated handler is one who operates a plant(s) that is not under the provisions of any federal order. Exception: If qualified as a regulated or other order handler, only the plant is non-regulated.

Subdealer

A subdealer is a handler who (a) does not own, operate, or lease a plant and (b) does not pasteurize or bottle milk but (c) does purchase packaged products from another handler for distribution according to the methods previously set forth. This term does not include a store.

Market Share

The market share is the percentage of sales that an individual handler or grouping of handlers has relative to all sales in the marketing area.

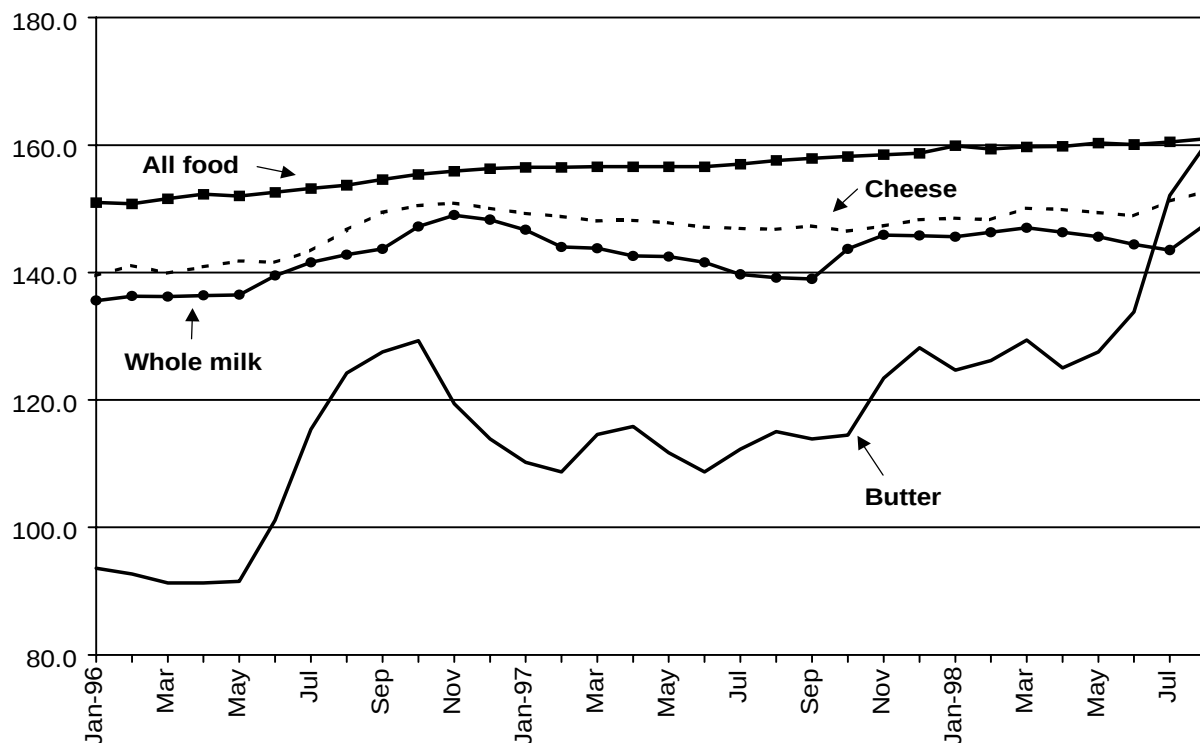

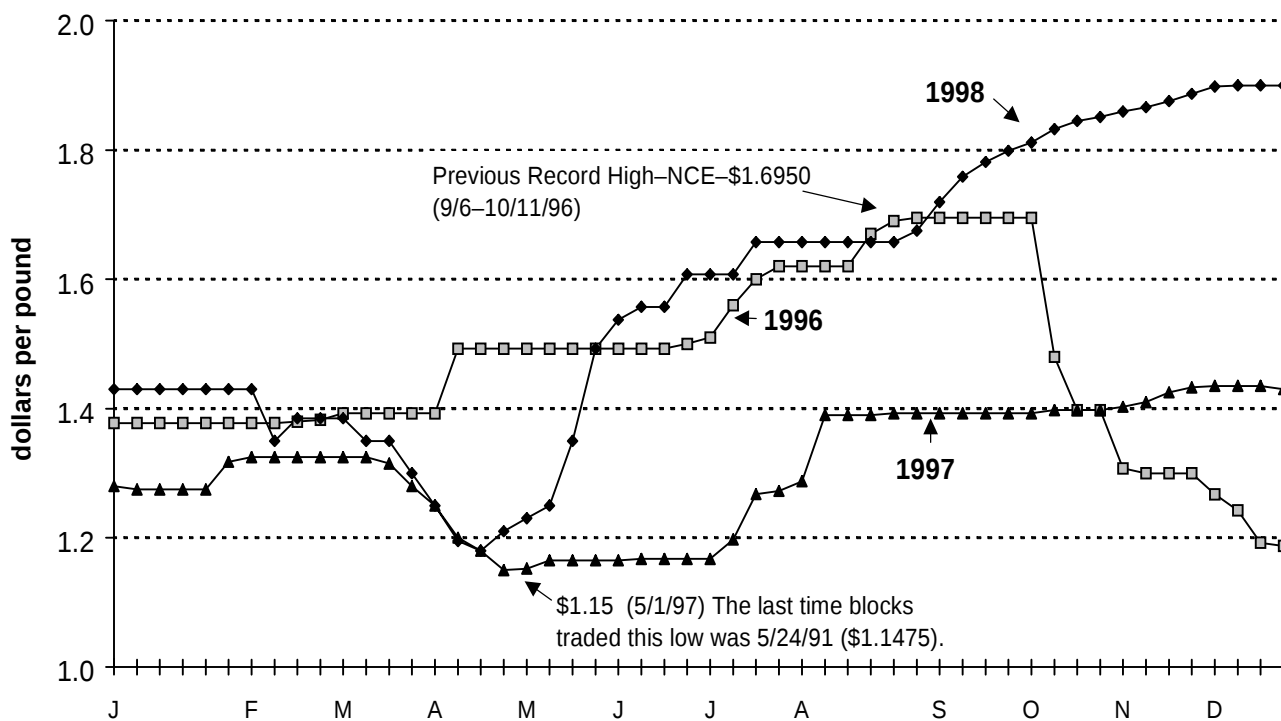
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Chicago Mercantile Exchange 40-pound Block Cheddar*, 1996–1998

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Summary

Record prices marked the last 4 months of 1998. The year finished with an annual average uniform price of \$14.73 per hundredweight, \$0.32 higher than the last record-setting price—the 1996 average. Total producer milk receipts finished 1.1 percent above 1997, not as strong as originally forecasted. Lower production throughout the nation resulted in less cheese production and butter shortages, which helped bolster prices through the second half of 1998.

The series of tables in this report provide information about the operation of Order No. 2 during 1998. The *Bulletin Highlights* section summarizes, on a monthly basis, important events that impacted the dairy industry in 1998.

Milk Receipts

As mentioned above, producer milk receipts increased 1.1 percent in 1998. For the first half of 1998, milk receipts grew 4.3 percent from the same period in 1997. During the second half, milk receipts dropped 2.1 percent from the comparable period.

The first quarter of 1998 saw producer numbers at or above the previous year's. By April, pooling changes resulted in handlers moving producers out of Order No. 2. The decline continued throughout the rest of 1998, resulting in an average number of producers that was 455 fewer than in 1997. This loss of producers fueled the decline in milk receipts during the second half of 1998.

Annual average daily deliveries per producer (DDP) increased 183 pounds (5.8 percent) from 1997. Most of the gain is attributable to the change in farm structure within the order.

Utilization

Milk used for Class I purposes (fluid drinking milk) grew 2.8 percent in 1998 and increased utilization by 0.7 percentage points. Class II usage declined 5.1 percent; utilization dropped 0.9 percentage points. Milk used in Class III increased 2.9 percent, up 0.7 percentage points. Class III-A usage dropped 11.5 percent, down 0.3 percentage points.

Prices

BFP—The 1998 Basic Formula Price (BFP) averaged \$14.20 per hundredweight, an increase of \$2.15 (17.8 percent) from the 1997 annual average. This price set a new BFP record averaging \$0.81 (6 percent) higher than the previous record of \$13.39, set in 1996.

The 40-pound block Cheddar cheese price reported on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange (CME) was \$1.43 per pound at the beginning of 1998. It bottomed out at \$1.18 in May and then began rising, reaching its

record-breaking peak of \$1.90 in December. Correspondingly, the BFP followed a similar path. It started the year fairly strong with an average over \$13.00 for the first quarter. By May, it had plummeted to \$10.76. From there, it rose and set records for each of the last 4 months of 1998. It peaked at \$17.34 per hundredweight in December.

Class Prices—Due to their linkage to the BFP, class prices followed a similar pattern throughout 1998. Class I and II prices averaged \$1.77 higher than in 1997 and were the highest on record. The Class III price increase mirrored the BFP's. The Class III-A price averaged \$2.50 higher than in 1997.

The Order No. 2 uniform price averaged \$14.73 per hundredweight, up \$1.97 (15.4 percent) from last year. The last 4 months finished with consecutive record-setting highs.

Support Prices—As required under the Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform Act (FAIR Act) of 1996, the support price for milk containing 3.67 percent butterfat decreased \$0.15 to \$10.05 per hundredweight on January 1, 1998. In addition, the Commodity Credit Corporation reduced purchase prices for nonfat dry milk by 1.9 cents per pound and block Cheddar and barrel cheese by 1.5 cents per pound. The FAIR Act provides for the complete phase-out of the support program by December 31, 1999.

Butterfat Differential—Low milk production resulted in decreased supplies of butterfat. This, combined with lower inventories of butter in recent years, resulted in record-high butter prices. The butterfat differential reflected the high butter prices and set its own record in 1998. The differential averaged \$0.192 per hundredweight, up 69.9 percent from 1997 and 12.3 percent higher than the previous record set in 1984 (\$0.171 per hundredweight).

Federal Order Reform

On January 23, 1998, USDA Secretary Dan Glickman issued a proposed rule announcing changes to the Federal Milk Marketing Order program as instructed in the FAIR Act of 1996.

On October 21, 1998, the President signed the Omnibus Consolidated Emergency Supplemental Appropriations Bill that, among other things, extended the deadline for completing federal milk marketing order reform. The FAIR Act set April 4, 1999, as the date for completing order reform. The new implementation date is October 1, 1999, with a final rule to be submitted to Congress between February 1 and April 4, 1999.

Primary type of operation accounts for greater than 90 percent of milk usage at the plant.

Plants with two codes (i.e., P/M), have a secondary type of operation accounting for a minimum of 10 percent of plant milk usage. For a secondary transfer operation, this amount must be at least 250,000 pounds in addition to the percentage requirement.

Bulletin Highlights—1998

January

USDA issued a proposed rule announcing changes to the Federal Milk Marketing Order program. The proposed rule highlights and Order No. 2 specific changes were discussed.

The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit granted an extension of the 3-month stay previously granted by the U.S. District Court, District of Minnesota, on its order that prevented the Secretary of Agriculture from enforcing existing Class I price differentials in certain federal milk marketing orders.

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced that a public hearing would be held in response to industry requests to consider flooring the level of the Basic Formula Price.

The NYS Dairy Task Force completed its deliberations and released a report containing the recommendations aimed at ensuring the survival of dairy farms in New York State.

USDA announced four public hearings to discuss the department's proposed rule for a National Organic Program.

The National Commission on Small Farms released their report titled "A Time to Act."

Plants, Handlers, and Bulk Tank Units Under the New York-New Jersey Marketing Order for December 1997 was compiled.

NYS Department of Agriculture and Markets' Division of Statistics released the 1996 report on total cash receipts from farm marketings.

February

Order reform update: USDA extended the comment period for the proposed rule on federal milk order reform until April 30, 1998. Secretary Glickman also announced that USDA would hold four public

listening sessions.

Both Dairy Farmers of America, Inc. and Dairylea Cooperative Inc. announced educational seminar schedules for Order No. 2 producers.

USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service's January 1, 1998, cattle inventory report was summarized.

Total 1997 U.S. milk production was compared to the previous year; top states were highlighted.

March

Order reform update: Over 100 people attended the regional USDA listening session held in Liverpool (Syracuse), NY, on March 30. USDA's Food and Nutrition Services issued a *Report on the Impacts of the Federal Milk Marketing Order Reform Proposals on Food and Nutrition Service Programs, Participants, and Administering Institutions*.

Producer milk receipts and prices for the first 3 months of 1998 were highlighted.

Butter and cheese wholesale prices were higher during the first quarter of 1998 than in the first quarter of 1997.

Total packaged fluid milk sales in the NY-NJ milk marketing area declined in 1997 despite the growth in sales of skim and flavored products.

The NY Milk Promotion Advisory Board released their annual report.

April

Wholesale butter and cheese prices fluctuated.

Order No. 2 mailbox prices during 1996-97 were compared.

The November 1997 container sales survey for the NY-NJ Milk Marketing Area was completed.

The top ten supply counties in Order No. 2 during 1997 were highlighted.

May

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced that the petition to floor the level of the Basic Formula Price was denied.

U.S. milk production trends in three areas of the country were discussed.

The NYS Department of Agriculture and Markets announced a herd indemnity program for dairy cows lost as a result of the January 1998 ice storm.

USDA released its 1997 Dairy Products Summary.

Secretary Dan Glickman announced the seven states selected for participation in the Dairy Options Pilot Program.

June

Prices for 40-pound block Cheddar cheese increased to near-record high levels. Butter skyrocketed to record-high prices.

Average butterfat tests under Order No. 2 for the first 5 months of 1998 were compared to the previous 10 years.

Producer milk receipts and prices during the first 6 months of 1998 were highlighted.

Chicago Mercantile Exchange discontinued trading Grade A and B butter on the spot market; a new butter price series was announced.

USDA asked for nominations to serve on the National Dairy Promotion and Research Board.

USDA announced a Dairy Production Disaster Assistance Program for dairy producers suffering financial losses due to recent natural disasters.

July

The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit issued a ruling in *Minnesota Milk Producers et al. v. Dan Glickman* that reversed a lower court ruling and found Class I

differentials legal.

Order reform update: USDA was reviewing nearly 4,500 comments regarding the January 1998 proposed rule.

Order No. 2 announced its web site.

The methodology for forecasting the uniform (blend) price under Order No. 2 was explained.

Total sales of packaged fluid milk products inside the NY-NJ milk marketing area continued to decline in the first 6 months of 1998.

Wholesale market prices for butter and cheese remained at record levels after bottoming out in early May.

August

Milk pooled under Order No. 2 was shipped to plants in the southeastern United States.

Federal milk marketing order reform information became available on a two-volume compact disk set.

The Northeast Dairy Compact Commission reimbursed USDA for product purchases.

The Chicago Mercantile Exchange began daily cash trading of cheese and nonfat dry milk on September 1.

Mailbox prices under Order No. 2 averaged higher in the first 6 months of 1998 than during the same time period in 1997.

The National Agricultural Statistics Service indicated that milk production gained slightly in major dairy states through the first 8 months of 1998.

USDA amended the Fluid Milk Promotion Order.

Regional industry consolidations involving milk processing plants located in the Northeast were highlighted.

September

More milk pooled under Order No. 2 was shipped to plants in the southeastern United States.

The September butterfat differential set a record at 32.5 cents per tenth of a point of butterfat.

A look at the consumer price index compared dairy products with all food.

An update on Order No. 2 milk receipts and prices for the January–September period was given.

Dairylea held its annual meeting and announced its officers and directors for the 1998–99 fiscal year.

A proposal to amend the producer-funded Dairy Promotion and Research Order was published in the *Federal Register*.

Secretary Dan Glickman announced his plans to create a Council on Small Farms and a new office at the USDA that will deal specifically with small farm issues.

October

Order reform update: The implementation date set for completing federal milk marketing order reform was extended to October 1, 1999. Other new requirements were discussed.

Total packaged fluid milk sales in the NY–NJ milk marketing area continued to decline in July–September compared to the same period in 1997.

USDA's Risk Management Agency scheduled training sessions for the Dairy Options Pilot Program.

The annual Northeast Regional Dairy Outlook Conference was held.

USDA held a referendum on the continuation of the Fluid Milk Promotion Order.

The Nebraska–Western Iowa and Upper Midwest federal milk marketing orders were amended.

November

Northeast Compact update: Eligible Compact producers approved changes to the Compact's

over-order pricing regulations. The U.S. District Court for the District of Massachusetts issued a ruling in favor of the Compact Commission. The Compact Commission held three hearings in December 1998.

The Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) purchased a total of 121.3 million pounds of nonfat dry milk under the dairy price support program during the 1998 marketing year.

A final rule amending the Dairy Promotion and Research Order was issued. The USDA announced that fluid milk processors voted to continue a national program for fluid milk promotion.

The U.S. Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit issued an Order denying a rehearing on pricing of Class I milk.

Mailbox prices for Order No. 2 were shown for January through September 1998.

Wholesale dairy product prices continued to show volatility.

USDA disbursed \$10 million in disaster relief fund payments to eligible dairy producers.

December

Wholesale cheese prices on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange dropped during the first part of January 1999.

The Secretary of Agriculture announced appointments to the National Dairy Promotion and Research Board.

The Order No. 2 administrative assessment decreased effective January 1, 1999.

1998 Order No. 2 producer milk receipts and prices were summarized.

The CCC decreased the support price for milk.

Average butterfat tests in 1998 were lower than the 10-year average; however, butterfat differentials reached record levels.

Disclosure:

The implementation of improvements in property accountability at the beginning of 1998 included several accounting adjustments that are reflected in these financial statements.

An increase in the threshold for capitalization of fixed assets to \$2,000 resulted in significant reduction in the amounts of fixed assets carried on the balance sheet.

The total book value of fixed assets that were removed from the balance sheet in the January 1998 adjustment was \$189,175.57. The total of their accumulated depreciation was \$122,920.36 and their net depreciated book value was \$66,255.21, while \$48,166.06 of their net value was charged to supplies as part of the adjustment.

A charge was made to depreciation expense resulting from a change in method of valuation that reduced or eliminated the salvage value of many fixed assets by \$18,089.15.

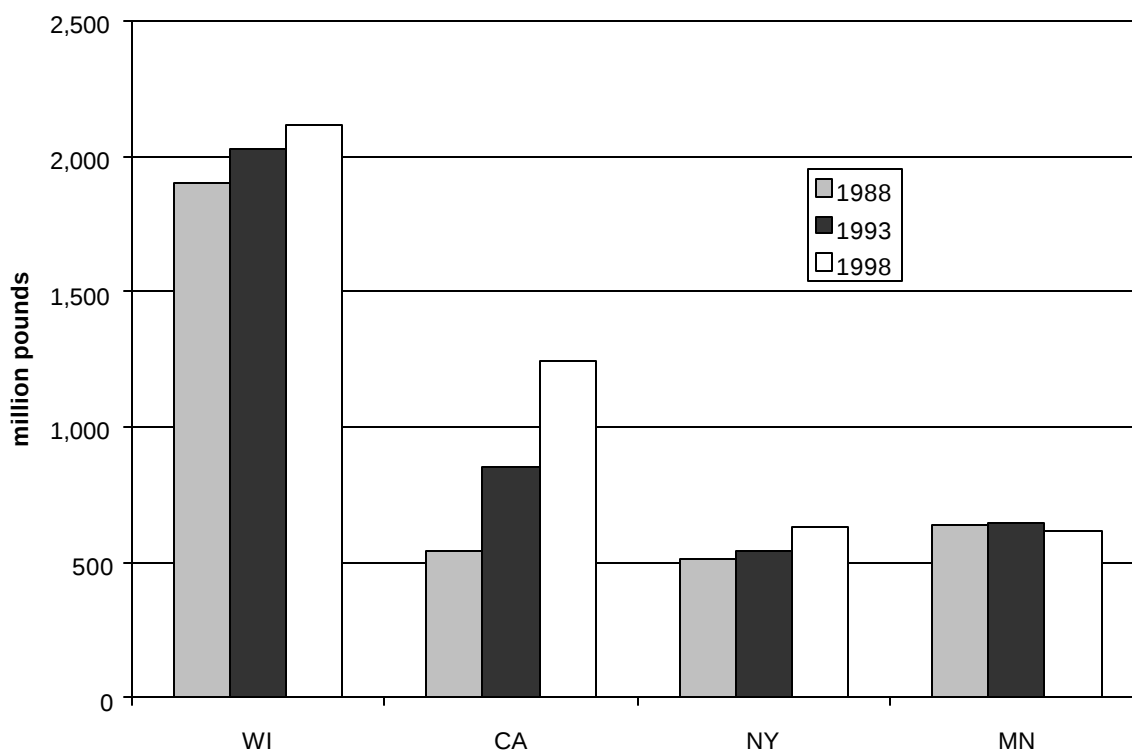

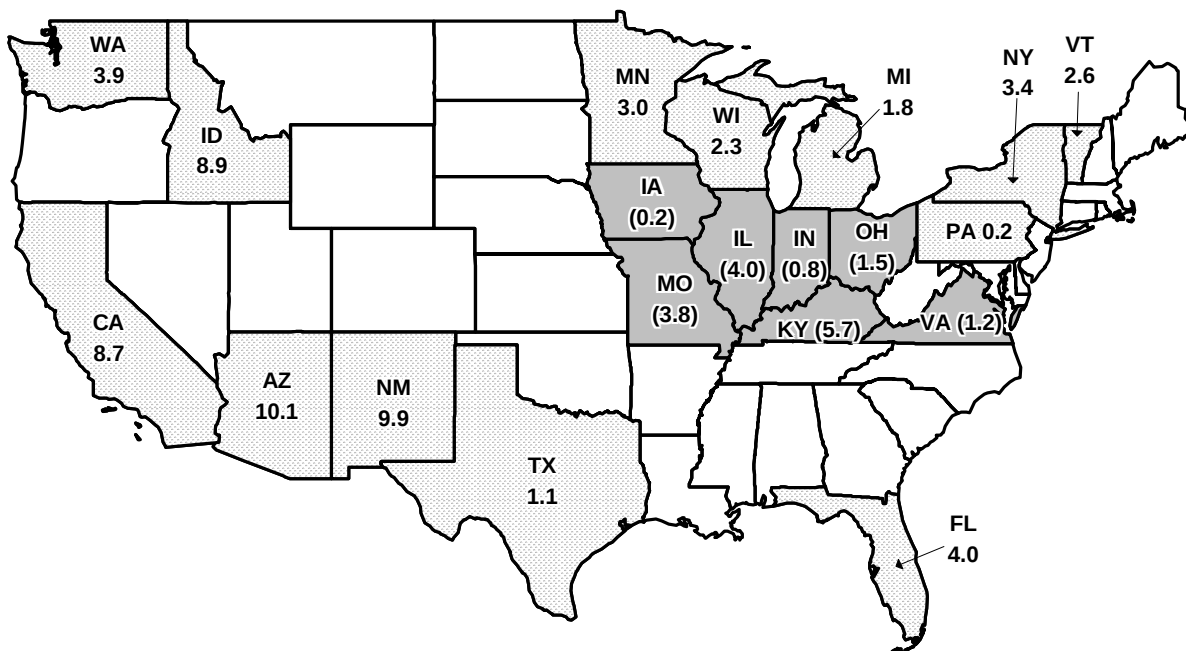

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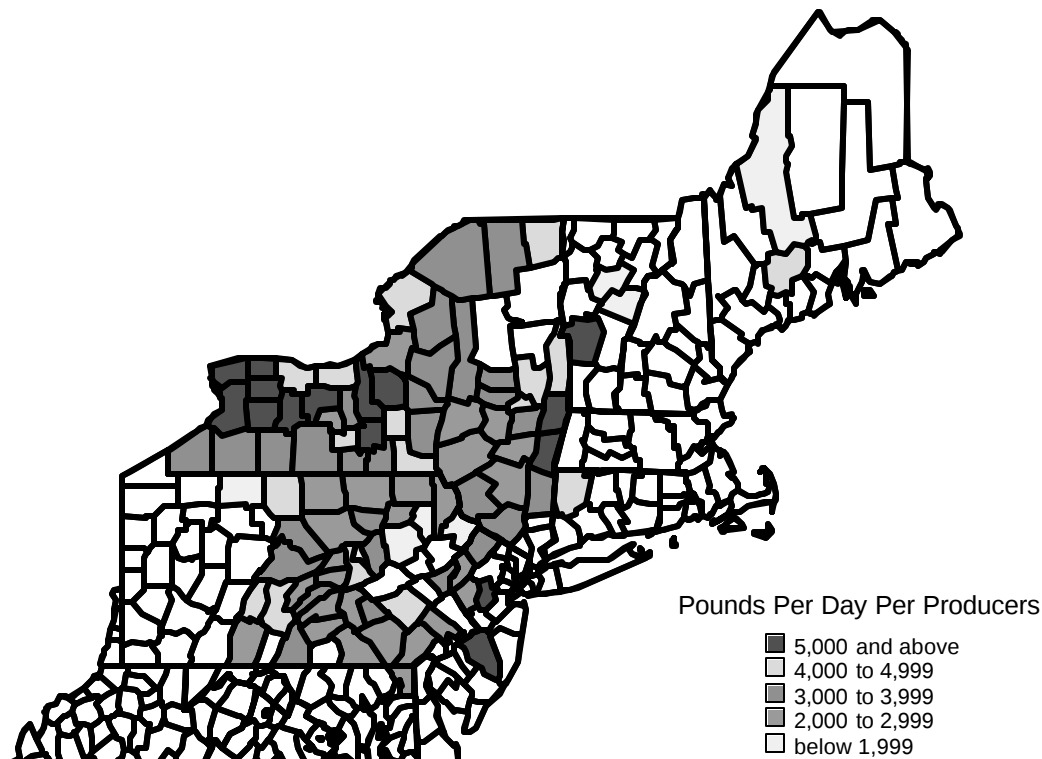

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1999 Annual Report

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Summary

1999 finished with the third highest average uniform price under Order No. 2—\$14.00 per hundredweight. This was a decline of \$0.73 per hundredweight (5 percent) from 1998. Total producer milk receipts equaled 11.7 billion pounds, down 2.1 percent from 1998.

The series of tables in this report provide information about the operation of the New York–New Jersey Milk Marketing Area (Order No. 2) during 1999. The *Bulletin Highlights* section summarizes, on a monthly basis, important events that impacted the dairy industry in 1999.

This will be the last *Annual Summary* published for Order No. 2. Federal order reform mandated by the Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform Act of 1996 (FAIR Act) was completed near the end of 1999. Beginning January 1, 2000, the New York–New Jersey Milk Marketing Area was merged into the new Northeast Order (Order No. 1). Subsequent issues will include data for this enlarged area.

Milk Receipts

As stated above, total producer milk receipts for 1999 were down from the previous year. A combination of pooling changes, farm exits, and slower milk production growth resulted in the decline. Some producers became pooled by handlers regulated by other federal orders or the Western New York State Milk Marketing Area. These changes occurred to fulfill milk supply contracts or to achieve better pricing.

The year finished with 6 percent fewer producers than at the end of 1998. Even though prices have been strong the last few years, farm exits still occurred at a faster rate than new entries. Many farms were absorbed by larger ones, evidenced in the 5.9 percent increase in daily deliveries per producer (DDP).

Lastly, even though milk production rebounded during 1999 in much of the country, the Northeast lagged behind in growth. Nationally, the increase from 1998 was 3.4 percent with states such as California, New Mexico, and Idaho experiencing respective growth rates of 10.2, 8.5, and 11.9 percent. While New York's production grew 2.5 percent, Pennsylvania experienced an increase of only 0.8 percent as severe heat and drought impacted milk production. New York accounted for 44.2 percent of all production in the Northeast in 1999; Pennsylvania had 40.1 percent. In Order No. 2 during 1999, New York accounted for 71.8 percent of total milk receipts; Pennsylvania had 26.2 percent.

Utilization

Milk used for Class I purposes (fluid drinking milk) declined 3.6 percent in 1999. Class II usage (creams, soft cheeses, yogurt, and frozen desserts) increased 0.2

percent. Milk used in Class III (hard cheeses, butter, condensed and most dry products) declined 0.8 percent. Class III-A usage (nonfat dry milk) dropped 10.1 percent.

Prices

BFP—The Basic Formula Price (BFP) finished strong at the end of 1998. Due to advanced class pricing, this resulted in high Class I and II prices for January and February 1999. Record month-to-month declines in the BFP occurred in both February and October, but the lowest BFP witnessed in over 20 years hit in November 1999. The strong milk production, previously discussed, and sufficient cheese kept 1999 milk prices below 1998's record levels. On the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, 40-pound block cheese prices averaged 7.8 percent below 1998's.

Class Prices—As mentioned above, advanced class pricing affects the second succeeding month. Therefore, the November BFP did not affect Class I and II pricing during 1999. As a result, Class I and II prices averaged \$0.12 per hundredweight higher than in 1998. Class III prices (equivalent to the BFP) averaged \$1.77 per hundredweight (12.5 percent) lower than in 1998. Class III-A prices were down \$2.72 per hundredweight (18.3 percent) from the previous year's.

Support Prices—The FAIR Act provided for the complete phase-out of support prices for products purchased by the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC). Under this bill, the program was to expire on December 31, 1999. On December 15, 1999, USDA announced that the program was extended through the calendar year 2000 by the Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2000. All purchase prices for cheese, butter, and nonfat dry milk remained at their current level.

Butterfat Differential—The butterfat differential for 1999 averaged nearly 36 percent below 1998's as a result of lower butter prices. Under federal order reform, the butterfat differential has been eliminated. Multiple component pricing replaces the standard butterfat pricing used for many decades.

Federal Order Reform

The many years spent on federal order reform finally came to fruition. On March 31, 1999, USDA released the final decision on reform. Informational meetings were held with producers and handlers during the spring. A referendum was completed in August granting approval. The new federal order was to begin October 1, 1999, but implementation was delayed by court action. On November 29, President Clinton signed the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2000, legislating implementation effective January 1, 2000.

Bulletin Highlights—1999

January

The effect of the Chicago Mercantile Exchange's cheese prices on uniform prices for upcoming months was discussed.

Total packaged fluid milk sales in the New York–New Jersey milk marketing area continued to decline in 1998.

The Order No. 2 statistical handbook became available on the Order's web site, along with the *Bulletin*, price announcements, and most other publications.

Plants, Handlers, and Bulk Tank Units Under the New York–New Jersey Marketing Order for December 1998 was compiled.

February

USDA Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced a \$200 million Dairy Income Loss Assistance program for dairy farmers facing greatly reduced milk prices.

Dairy Farmers of America, Inc. and Dairy Lea Cooperative Inc. each announced a schedule of educational outreach meetings for Order No. 2 producers.

The New York Dairy Promotion Advisory Board sought nominations to fill its Board positions. The Board released its annual report.

Annual 1997-98 mailbox prices for Order No. 2 were compared.

March

Agriculture Secretary Glickman released the final decision on Federal Milk Marketing Order Reform.

1998 U.S. milk production was compared to 1997. The top ten milk-producing states were listed.

Producer milk receipts and prices for the first quarter of 1999 were analyzed.

April

Final decision informational meetings, open to all Northeast region producers, were listed.

Cheddar cheese prices fell and butter prices rose on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

The top ten supply counties in Order No. 2 during 1998 were highlighted.

Total packaged fluid milk sales declined in the New York–New Jersey milk marketing area during the first quarter.

USDA sought nominations from dairy producers and farm organizations to the National Dairy Promotion and Research Board.

January 1999's U.S. cattle inventory showed a continuing decline since 1996.

Selected statistics for the combined Northeast orders for 1997, 1998, and January–March 1999 were shown in tabular form.

May

Multiple component pricing (MCP) and the producer price differential (PPD) were explained.

U.S. production of manufactured dairy products was summarized for 1998.

Mailbox prices for the first quarter of 1999 were reviewed.

June

Order reform update: USDA issued a referendum order on the final decision on July 14th. On July 8th, USDA issued corrections to the final

decision. The corrections did not change the conclusions and did not substantively alter the regulatory provisions.

The differences in plant-point pricing and farm-point pricing were explained.

U.S. milk production, disposition, and income were summarized for 1998.

Producer milk receipts and prices during the first 6 months of 1999 were highlighted.

Payments to dairy farmers, suffering from record low milk prices based on 1997 or 1998 milk production, began under the Dairy Market Loss Assistance Program.

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced two new appointments. He promoted Enrique Figueroa to Deputy Under Secretary of Agriculture for Marketing and Regulatory Programs, and replaced Figueroa with Kathleen Merrigan as Administrator of the Agricultural Marketing Service.

July

Secretary Glickman announced that a second round of the Dairy Options Pilot Program (DOPP) would be conducted later in the year.

Cheese prices at the Chicago Mercantile Exchange reached record highs, and butter prices went well below 1998 record levels.

Compared with the first 6 months of 1998, total sales of packaged fluid milk products in the New York–New Jersey milk marketing area declined during the first half of 1999.

According to a survey released by the National Agricultural Statistics

Service (NASS), on-farm computer usage and ownership have increased dramatically.

The Market Administrator's administrative assessment was waived for the months of August and September 1999.

The Agriculture Secretary announced appointments of nine incumbents and four new members to the National Fluid Milk Processor Promotion Board.

August

Order reform update: In producer referendums ending August 6, eligible dairy farmers across the country voted in favor of consolidating 31 federal milk marketing orders into 11 regional orders, and they approved the reforms presented in the final decision.

Milk pooled under Order No. 2 was shipped to plants in the southeastern United States.

After setting a record high, cheese prices fell at the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

Mailbox prices under Order No. 2 averaged higher for the first 6 months of 1999 compared with the same period in 1998.

September

Order reform update: The United States District Court for the District of Vermont issued a Temporary Restraining Order that stopped the Secretary of Agriculture from implementing changes to federal milk marketing orders. The anticipated reform was scheduled to be effective October 1, 1999.

Ronald C. Pearce, Market Administrator of the New York–New

Jersey Milk Marketing Area, retired on September 30, 1999. Erik F. Rasmussen was designated the Acting Market Administrator.

Total producer milk receipts under Order No. 2 decreased from January through September 1999, compared to the same 9-month period during 1998.

A map showed federal order and California state milk marketings for May 1999.

Cheese showed to be the only dairy product to experience sustained growth for the past 25 years in per capita consumption.

More milk pooled under Order No. 2 was shipped to plants in the southeastern United States.

October

Order reform update: Because of delays due to legal action, federal orders continued to operate as they had in the past.

Wholesale prices for 40-pound block Cheddar cheese sold on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange dropped to the support purchase price of USDA's open offer.

Total packaged fluid milk sales in the New York–New Jersey milk marketing area for the first 9 months of 1999 were nearly even with sales during the same period in 1998.

The annual Northeast Regional Dairy Outlook Conference was held.

The import share of food consumption in the United States was discussed.

The Secretary of Agriculture announced appointments to the National Dairy Promotion and Research Board.

November

Order reform update: President Clinton signed the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2000, legislating implementation of the federal order consolidation and reform final rule effective January 1, 2000.

The administrative assessment and the marketing services deduction for the consolidated Northeast order were stated.

Marketing services regulations under the consolidated Northeast Marketing Order were explained.

The November basic formula price (BFP) plummeted to the lowest level in over two decades.

Mailbox prices for the first 9 months of 1999 were reviewed and showed to average higher than those during the same period in 1998.

A map illustrated modified Option 1A Class I differentials for selected Northeast states.

December

Changes in price information and release dates under the Northeast Order were explained.

Order No. 2 statistics for 1999 were summarized.

USDA updated its projections for total milk production to decrease.

Order No. 2 merged into the new Northeast Order No. 1. Some history of the former Order No. 2 was given.

The USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) announced that support prices were unchanged.

Agriculture Secretary Glickman named 19 members to serve on USDA's Advisory Committee on Small Farms.
