

## Statistical Uniform Price at Boston, MA



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## Summary

This *Bulletin* provides information about the operation of the Northeast Order during 2011 through a series of tables and charts. The *Bulletin* Highlights section summarizes important events that impacted the dairy industry in 2011. Included are lists of handlers and cooperatives operating under the Order with their respective locations depicted on a map of the region.

### **Producer Milk Receipts Flat**

During 2011, the volume of milk received from producers shipping to handlers regulated under the Northeast Order totaled 24.4 billion pounds, basically unchanged from 2010. In March 2011, a pool distributing plant with considerable volume that began pooling on the Northeast Order in April 2010 became partially regulated. As a result, the volume associated with this plant was no longer pooled on the Northeast Order, resulting in some decline in the total volume.

Nationally, total milk production grew 1.8 percent during 2011, about the same increase as the previous year. In the Northeast, the milkshed states' production was nearly flat (decrease of 0.2 percent) with two of the major contributors, New York and Vermont, reporting increases of 0.9 and 0.7 percent, respectively; Pennsylvania reported an annual decrease of 1.2 percent.

The year ended with 552 fewer producers than at the end of 2010, more than twice the decline of the previous year. Annual average daily deliveries per producer (DDP) equaled 5,147 pounds, an increase of 3.7 percent from 2010, and a new record for the Order.

### **Class Utilization Changes**

Class I utilization averaged 41.4 percent in 2011, a decrease of 1.3 percentage points from the previous year. The total volume of milk used in Class I declined 3.0 percent. The change in pooling status of the plant mentioned above also contributed to this decline. Class II usage jumped 10.5 percent, resulting in overall utilization of 23.5 percent, an increase of 2.2 percentage points. The growth in Greek-style yogurt largely was the driving force behind the substantial increase in the Class II volume during the past two years.

Class III volume grew 2.4 percent in 2011 and averaged 25.1 percent, up 0.6 percentage points. The amount of milk used in Class IV dropped 12.5 percent and accounted for an annual average of 10.1 percent utilization, down 3.5 percentage points.

### **Fluid Sales Decline; Organic Grow**

Sales of fluid milk products in the Northeast Milk Marketing Area declined 2.3 percent in 2011. Decreases occurred in all categories except organic milk products and eggnog. Organic whole milk sales jumped 10.7 percent from 2010, while organic fat-reduced milk (organic reduced fat, lowfat, fatfree, and

flavored fat-reduced products) grew 10.4 percent.

### **Record Setting Prices**

Wholesale dairy product prices were fairly strong throughout most of 2011, with record-setting levels in many months. Correspondingly, component prices for milk rose to record-setting high prices in all classes.

The Class I price averaged \$22.38 per hundredweight in 2011, \$3.78 (20.3 percent) above the 2010 annual average. The Class II price averaged \$19.62 per hundredweight, \$3.60 per hundredweight and 22.4 percent higher than the previous year. The Class III price averaged \$18.37 per hundredweight, up \$3.96 per hundredweight and 27.5 percent over 2010. The Class IV price rose \$3.95, an increase of 26.2 percent, and averaged \$19.04 per hundredweight.

Overall, the statistical uniform price (blend) reported at Suffolk County, Massachusetts (Boston) averaged \$20.64 per hundredweight, the first time since the Order's inception that the annual blend price averaged over \$20.00 per hundredweight. Throughout the year, it was higher than \$20.00 during 9 months, compared to 7 months in 2007. The annual average uniform price was \$3.72 (22.0 percent) higher than the 2010 price and nearly a dollar over the previous record set in 2007. The producer price differential (PPD) averaged \$2.28 per hundredweight in 2011, 23 cents less than the average in 2010, but was the fourth highest annual average PPD on record.

### **Component Pricing**

The price paid to producers for butterfat averaged \$2.1535 per pound, 16.2 percent higher than in 2010, and set a record high since the Order's inception. The per-pound annual average protein price was \$2.9663 per pound (third highest on record), up 28.5 percent from 2010. The other solids price increased 93.2 percent and averaged \$0.3434 per pound, the second highest other solids price ever. The nonfat solids price rose 33.7 percent and averaged \$1.3246 per pound, the second highest ever reported.

### **Producer Tests**


The annual average producer butterfat test equaled 3.73 percent in 2011, an increase of 3 percentage points from the previous year and tied with 2008 for the highest annual average. Records were set during the first four months of 2011. The annual average producer protein test was 3.07 percent, up 2 percentage points from 2010 and a new record for the Order. Records also were set during the first four months of the year. The annual average producer other solids test increased 1 percentage point to 5.73 percent, setting a new record high annual average. Record highs were set or tied with previous records in ten months of 2011.







**4 Class IV Prices, 2007–2011**






**Contribution by Components to Statistical Uniform Price, 2007–2011**



**Figure 6****Figure 7**



## 9 Receipts of Milk from Producers, by State\*, 2011











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

## Bulletin Highlights —2011

### January

Sales of Class I fluid milk products for 2010 were compared to 2009. Volume and percent change information for 2009 and 2010 were shown in a table along with proportion of total estimated U.S. sales.

Benefits from "higher of" pricing in the Northeast Order were summarized and discussed. A chart illustrated actual and estimated uniform prices with and without "higher of" pricing in the Northeast Order for January 2010 through December 2011.

The market service department checked 356 farm bulk tanks throughout the Northeast Marketing Area milkshed during the 2010 season. A table illustrated the 2010 tank calibrations work by tank size.

### February

Milk price projections based on Chicago Mercantile Exchange (CME) future prices were discussed for 2011.

Record high average producer component tests in recent months were discussed. A table compared weighted average component tests by size category for December 2001 and December 2010. Another table showed the additional value to Northeast Order producers from higher component tests in December 2010 versus lower tests in 2001.

U.S. milk production increased 1.8 percent in 2010, following a decline of 0.9 percent in 2009. A table ranked the top ten states by 2010 production.

### March

The decline of producers showed the continuing trend toward fewer farmers producing more milk. Accompanying charts showed a comparison of producer and milk deliveries per day, and the annual average milk cows and production per cow for the Northeast Order from 2000 through 2010.

The market situation was updated and discussed. The March 2011 Northeast uniform price topped \$20 per hundredweight for the first time since July 2008. Using current CME futures prices to predict National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) survey prices suggested a 2011 average uniform price for the Northeast Order of \$20.18 per hundredweight and no Milk Income Loss Contract (MILC) payments for the year. A chart illustrated block Cheddar cheese, butter, and nonfat dry milk weekly commodity prices on the CME from January 2011 through March 2011.

A pool summary for all federal orders was given in a table for January–March, 2010 and 2011.

### April

Cheese stocks, the key component used in the examination of the supply and demand for dairy products, were discussed. A chart illustrated total cheese production and stocks from 1980 through 2011.

USDA released their *Dairy Products 2010 Summary*, a publication reporting dairy products manufactured in the United States. A table showed a year-to-year comparison of selected U.S. manufactured dairy products from 2009 and 2010.

The Northeast Milk Marketing Area announced the tentative calibration truck schedule for 2011.

### May

The Class I utilization of 37.8 percent for May 2011 set a record low since the Order's inception. Trends in total and Class I volumes, along with the impact of higher prices, were discussed as possible factors for lower Class I pounds and percentages. Charts illustrated the Northeast Order Class I price and the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for milk from 2001 through 2011 and selected dairy consumption and product statistics from 1924 through 2004.

The contribution to the producer blend price by components was discussed and accompanied by a table showing the contribution by component for the months of May 2003, May 2008, May 2011, and November 2000.

USDA issued a proposed rule to amend the Dairy Product Mandatory Reporting Program that would establish an electronic reporting system for manufacturers to report sales information for specific dairy products.

### June

USDA announced an Action Plan on Proposed Amendments of pooling standards for the Mideast Milk Marketing Order.

Utilization of milk products and cream by pool plants was compared for the first 6 months of 2011 to the same time period in 2010 and 2006. A table showed Northeast utilization for selected products for this time period.

A pool summary for all federal orders was given in a table for January–June, 2010 and 2011.

Dairy product prices, dairy exports, and milk production for the first 6 months of 2011 were examined and discussed. A chart illustrated NASS product prices from January through June 2011.

### **July**

The changes in total utilization at regulated pool plants, unregulated manufacturing plants, and partially regulated plants for the first 6 months of 2011, 2010, and 2006 were discussed. A table showed volume utilized by type of plant in the Northeast Order.

A discussion emphasized that milk pooled in the Northeast, for the first 6 months of 2011, was higher than the growth in milk production for the U.S. A map illustrated the year-to-year percent change of milk production in the top 23 milk-producing states from January through June 2011.

Charts illustrated Northeast Order average producer butterfat, protein, and other solids tests, and daily deliveries per producer from July 2001 through July 2011.

### **August**

The Market Administrator received a request to increase the percentage of milk that pool supply plants and cooperative Section 1000.9(c) handlers must deliver to Class I pool distributing plants. It was determined that the dairy industry could resolve any temporary supply-utilization imbalances rather than resorting to administrative action.

Multiple factors were examined and discussed that contributed to the lower Class I utilization. A chart illustrated the CPI for milk, for all nonalcoholic beverages and beverage materials, and for food, with a comparison to the total average daily Class I utilization from July 2009 through July 2011.

The Market Administrator allowed handlers and cooperatives with producer milk dumps related to Hurricane Irene to pool milk on the Order for the month of August.

The USDA announced a public hearing to consider proposals to amend the pooling standards for pool distributing plants in the Mideast Milk Marketing Area.

### **September**

Sales of organic fluid milk products in the Northeast Milk Marketing Area for the first 6 months of 2011 were compared to the previous year. A table showed sales of organic versus all fluid milk products for the Northeast Order and estimated U.S., for January through June, 2010 and 2011.

For the third time in the past five marketing years the Commodity Credit Corporation did not purchase products under the support program.

MILC payments were predicted, as a possibility, to begin by January 2012, and to last much of the year based

on CME future prices as an estimate of where NASS milk and feed prices are headed. A table showed projections for Northeast Order prices and MILC payments from September 2011 through June 2012.

A pool summary for all federal orders was given in a table for January–September, 2010 and 2011.

### **October**

The 2011 Northeast Regional Dairy Outlook Conference was held on November 18 at the NASS New York field office. A table showed the statistical uniform prices for 2010, the actual and estimated prices for 2011, and the estimated prices for 2012.

Northeast milk production versus pooled milk for January through September 2011 was discussed. A map illustrated Northeast Order year-to-year percent change in pooled milk versus state milk production from January through September 2010 and 2011.

### **November**

USDA announced it was conducting its biennial container survey of all federal milk marketing areas that records packaged sales data for the month of November 2011.

The trend in producers and milk pooled by cooperative status on the Northeast Order was analyzed. A chart illustrated cooperative member producers and milk as a portion of total Northeast Order producers and milk pooled for the month of September from 2000 through 2011.

Milk shipments to southern and other federal orders were discussed. A table showed bulk milk shipments and receipts from other federal orders for the month of August, 2007 through 2011.

A calendar showed the 2012 dates for partial payments to producers who are not members of cooperatives. The Order requirement was explained.

### **December**

A negative Producer Price Differential was announced for milk delivered to plants located in the outer zones for December 2011.

Selected Northeast Order statistics for 2011 were summarized, and a table compared the Order's pool statistics for 2010 and 2011.

The CPI was compared to the Order's uniform price; a chart showed the trends in the Northeast Order uniform price index versus the Northeast region CPI from 2000 through 2011.

A pool summary for all federal orders was given in a table for January–December, 2010 and 2011.
